What Was Cleopatra like as a Leader?

Cleopatra was an intelligent and successful leader. She spoke lots of different languages. One of these languages was ancient Egyptian.

Cleopatra is thought to have offered stored grain to people in the city during a bad **drought**. This meant that everyone had something to eat and nobody went hungry.



Glossary

drought: A long time without rainfall that leads to a shortage in water.

Cleopatra VII was the last ruler of ancient Egypt. She ruled for around 21 years in the city of Alexandria.

Who Was Cleopatra?

Cleopatra was thought to have been born around 69 BC. She took over as the ruler of Egypt when her father died. Women were not allowed to rule on their own at the time. Therefore, Cleopatra's younger brother, who was called Ptolemy XIII, ruled with her.



Did You Know...?

Cleopatra was born in Egypt but her family were originally from Greece.



Cleopatra and Julius Caesar

Ptolemy XIII decided that he no longer wanted to rule with his sister so he had her thrown out of Alexandria. He had also managed to anger a Roman general named Julius Caesar at the same time. Caesar travelled to Alexandria and demanded to speak to Ptolemy XIII.

Cleopatra heard what had happened and wanted to speak to Caesar before her brother could. She wrapped herself in a duvet and had herself sent to Caesar. He was impressed and offered to help her to challenge her brother. This was successful and Cleopatra became the ruler of Egypt again.

Did You Know...? ◆

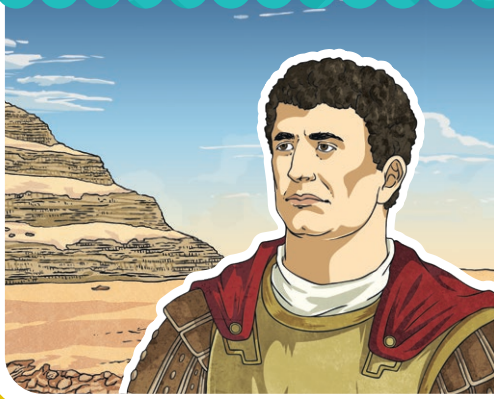


Cleopatra and Julius Caesar ◆

Cleopatra and Mark Antony ◆

Cleopatra is described by historians as a highly intelligent and successful leader. She spoke multiple languages and was believed to be the first in her family to do so. One of these languages was ancient Egyptian, which is thought to have made her popular with the local people.



During a particularly bad drought, Cleopatra is thought to have opened up the city's grain reserves. This meant that everyone had something to eat and that nobody went hungry. She also studied scrolls from the library of Alexandria.

Who Was Cleopatra?

Cleopatra was thought to have been born around 69 BC. Although she was born in Egypt, her family were Greek. When her father (Ptolemy XII) died, she took over as the ruler of Egypt. However, at the time, women were not allowed to rule on their own. Therefore, Cleopatra's younger brother (Ptolemy XIII) became joint ruler. At the time, Cleopatra was around the age of 18 and her brother was around the age of 10.

At the same time, Ptolemy XIII had angered a Roman general named Julius Caesar. Wanting to confront the leader, Caesar travelled to Alexandria and demanded to speak to Ptolemy XIII.

Cleopatra had heard what had happened and desperately wanted to speak to Caesar before her brother could.

7. Compare Cleopatra as a leader to Ptolemy XIII. How were they different?

Pupils' own responses, such as: Cleopatra spoke multiple languages but it is not thought that Ptolemy XIII did. In the text, it says that Cleopatra was a successful leader. However, when Ptolemy XIII was leading on his own, he managed to anger a Roman general.

8. Explain how you think Cleopatra felt when she was named as an enemy of the empire.

Pupils' own responses, such as: I think that Cleopatra felt as though it was unfair. It was Mark Antony who was originally from Rome and who had been saying things to anger people in Rome. I think that she was also probably a bit frightened because the Roman Empire was powerful enough to take over Egypt so you wouldn't want them as your enemy.
