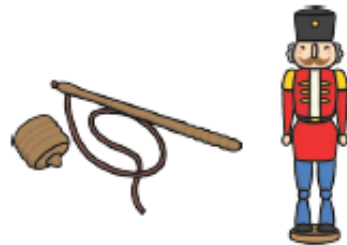

Victorian Toys

- 7 Victorian toys were usually made from wood,
15 metal and paper. The toys that Victorian children
25 had were very different if their family was rich or
26 poor.
- 34 Children from rich families played with toys
41 such as clockwork train sets, toy soldiers, rocking
49 horses, china dolls and dolls houses. In many
59 homes, the only toy children could play with on a
68 Sunday was Noah's Ark, because it was from the
69 Bible.
- 75 Children from poor families played with
83 homemade toys such as peg dolls. Rags were
91 stuffed with sawdust to make balls and toy
99 animals. If they were lucky, poor children were
106 sometimes bought cheap penny toys from the
107 market.
