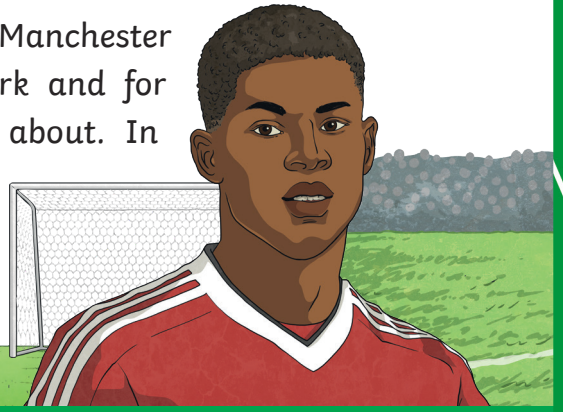


Marcus Rashford

Early Life

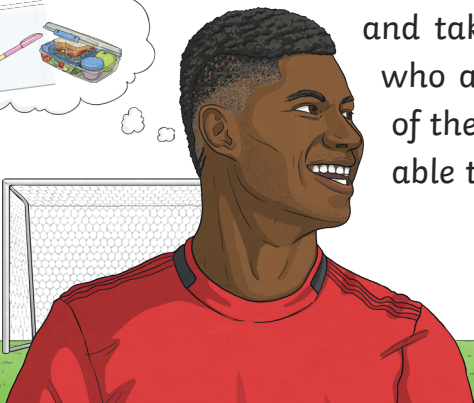
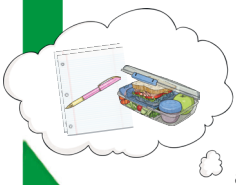
Marcus Rashford was born on the 31st October 1997. When he was seven years old, he joined the Manchester United academy system. At 11, Marcus's mum asked if he could start a programme that meant that he would be able to live closer to where he was training. Usually, the programme is only available when children are 12 but Marcus was allowed in a year early. When talking about his childhood, Marcus mentions the difficult decisions that his mum had to make so that he could have the best chance at success.

Football Career

In February 2016, Marcus played his first match for Manchester United in the Premier League. During this match, Marcus scored two goals and his team won. In May 2016, Marcus played for England. During his first match for the national team, he scored a goal in the third minute of the game: this made him the youngest ever player to score a goal for England in their first match.

Charity Work

When the UK went into lockdown to help to slow the spread of COVID-19, Marcus wanted to do something to help. As a result, he started working with a charity called FareShare. They collect food that is no longer needed and take it to charities who turn it into meals for people who are in need. Marcus wanted to help raise awareness of the amazing work that they do. In one week, they were able to feed three million people across the UK.



An Open Letter

On the 15th June 2020, Marcus Rashford wrote an open letter. This is a letter which is written to a specific person or group of people but it is shared for anyone to see. Marcus wrote his letter to all members of parliament.

In the letter, Marcus spoke about his childhood. He explained that his family often relied on school meals or the kindness of others for food. He also wrote about how his mother worked hard to make sure that his family wouldn't go hungry. He explained that this is something that he believes many families still find difficult today.

As a result, Marcus asked MPs to come together to help to solve the problem. When he was writing the letter, there were plans in place to stop a scheme (that helped to provide meals for school children) when the summer holidays started. Marcus asked for this decision to be changed and said that he felt as though he needed to use his voice to help others.

The letter was shared lots of times by people across the country. One day after it was shared, the decision was made to continue offering the scheme over the summer holidays. The Queen awarded Marcus with an MBE (also known as a knighthood) for his help with this.

Usually, the programme is only available to children over the age of 12 but Marcus was allowed in a year early. 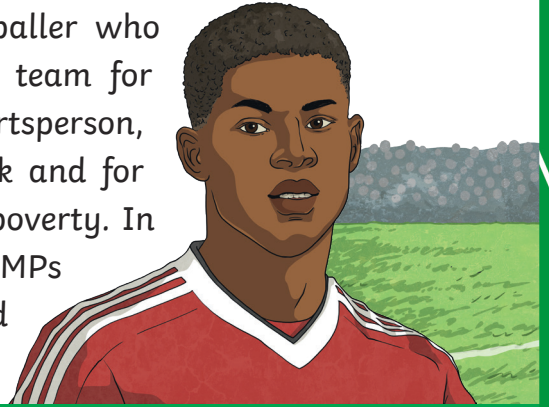

In June 2020, Marcus wrote a heartfelt letter to UK MPs asking them to reverse a decision that he believed would leave many children hungry.



Early Life and Football Career

Marcus Rashford was born on the 31st October 1997 in Wythenshawe, Manchester. By the time he was five, Marcus was playing football for the Fletcher Moss Rangers. At the age of seven, he joined the Manchester United academy system. Reflecting on his childhood, Marcus speaks about how his family would often struggle to have enough to eat. As a result, when he was 11 years old, Marcus's mum asked if he could start a programme that meant that he would be able to live in accommodation closer to Manchester United's training facilities. Usually, the programme is only available to those who are over the age of 12 but Marcus was accepted a year early. When talking about this part of his life, Marcus mentions the difficult decisions that his mum had to make in order for him to have the best chance at success.

In February 2016, Marcus made his debut for the Manchester United first team. In his initial match, he scored two goals against FC Midtjylland (a Danish football team). Just three days later, he played in his first match in the Premier League against Arsenal FC where he scored two further goals. In May 2016, Marcus made his debut for the national football team at just 18 years old. During his debut for England, he scored a goal in the third minute of the game. This made him the youngest ever player to score a goal for England in their debut match.

Charity Work

When the UK went into lockdown (to help to slow the spread of COVID-19), Marcus wanted to do something to help. As a result, he partnered with a charity called FareShare. They distribute food that is no longer needed between charities who then turn it into meals for people who are in need.

Marcus partnered with FareShare to help to raise awareness of the incredible work that they do. Initially, Marcus set out to help families in Manchester but has recently reported that they were able to feed three million people in one week across the UK.

An Open Letter to MPs

On the 15th June 2020, Marcus Rashford wrote an open letter to members of parliament in the UK: a letter addressed to a specific person or group of people but published for anyone to see. Marcus addressed his letter 'To all MPs in Parliament' and published it on his social media platform.

In the letter, Marcus spoke about how, while growing up, his family often relied on food banks, school meals or the generosity of others to keep them fed. He also wrote about how his mother worked hard to make sure that he, alongside his siblings, wouldn't go hungry. He stressed that this wasn't an easy task and something that he believes many families still find difficult today.

Drawing comparisons with his childhood and recent statistics about the number of children in a similar position, Marcus asked MPs to come together to help solve the problem. At the time of writing his letter, there were plans in place to cancel the food voucher scheme (which helps to provide meals to school-aged children) at the beginning of the school summer holidays. Marcus asked for this decision to be reversed, stating that he would be doing his community a disservice if he didn't use his voice to ask for help.

The letter was shared multiple times across many different platforms and was praised by people across the country. On 16th June 2020, just one day after the letter was published, the decision was made to continue offering food vouchers over the summer holidays. Marcus welcomed the decision but believes that more still needs to be done to make sure that everyone is able to get the help that they need. The Queen later awarded Marcus with an MBE (also known as a knighthood) for his help with this.
